County of Benton. On this first day of August
Eighteen Hundred and thirty three I, the undersigned
Judge of the County of Benton, State of Alabama, do hereby certify
that the County of Benton, State of Alabama, is a widow
of the County of Benton, State of Alabama, who has been
eighty five years, she being duly sworn according to
Law and her husband, makes the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made
by the Act of Congress passed July 7th 1832 entitled
"An Act granting half pay and pensions to certain
Widows." That she is the widow of John G. who
was a Major in the Revolutionary War and
served the command of Colonel G. of the
State of North Carolina and that she was
the command of the Officer two years as a private
and was discharged as a private. That she
Marjorie May was born in the County of Cass, State
of North Carolina the second in birth of the children of
John G. and the wife of John G. County of Cass and
North Carolina. She was at Wilmington and
Marched through that country under Major Hays
and was captured by the British. She lived in
Madison County, North Carolina. When she first saw
since she was a private under the command
of the Major named as well as an
in the battle at Kings
Mountain, North Carolina and I can attest to
that she is the widow of John G. and
she has been held and reputed and known
as a Revolutionary soldier and he was discharged
in the fall of the year 1775. She further declares
that she was married to the said John G. in
in the latter part of the year 1775 and she was
reputed as such at that day of the month of the year
1775 for me was made by Wm. William Veague

with big letters but by publication in North Carolina
 that her husband the above
 said Stephen Poo died on the 28th of July 1842
 that she had not married to ^{any other} man
 during the service to the end of the time so
 that it was known and reported generally
 as a soldier sworn to and subscribed
 the day and year above written before
 E. J. Smith judge of the County
 of Benton

 the County of Benton and State of Alabama and
 being sworn to and subscribed herby
 certifies that she is well acquainted with Mary
 Poo who she has seen and known to be the wife
 and also known to be the wife of Stephen Poo
 the husband of Mary Poo and that she is
 and believed in the neighborhood where he resided
 to have been a soldier of the revolution and that
 he died on the 28th of July 1842 and she believes
 that Mary Poo was his wife and subscribed the above
 Declaration as the wife of Stephen Poo and
 and that she consent in that Opinion
 sworn and subscribed the day and year
 above said
 E. J. Smith
 Judge of the County
 of Benton

And the said Court do hereby declare that
 Opinion after the investigation of the matter that
 the above named applicant was the wife of Stephen
 Poo deceased and that the deceased was a soldier
 of the Revolutionary War and served as the applicant

Attending in his declaration and the court further certifies that it appears him that Aaron Haggard who has signed the preceding certificate is a clergyman resident in the County of Benton and State of Arkansas and that Henry B. Watkins who has also signed the same is a resident in same and is a credible person and that this State County is entitled to credit
