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State of North Carolina } Declaration of James Holliman
Anson County } on the 9th day of October 1833
personal appeared before me James Gordon, one of the acting
Justices of the peace for the County of Anson James Holliman a
Soldier of the Revolution, he being very infirm and not able with
Convenience to travel to a Court of record and aged 83 years
who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make
the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of
the act of Congress passed June 9th 1832
That he entered the Service of the United States under the following
Named officers & served as herein stated - I turned out as a volunteer
under Capt Henry Finch to serve every Call of our officers to keep
under the Boys and other out lies in Johnson County & the adjacent
Countys. Serve two Months and was dismissed by Capt Finch the month &
year not recollected, but thinks it was at the beginning of the war -
Not long after I was drafted to serve a three months tour a private
in Capt Henry Finchs Company, again march to Kington on Meck
River, then across the River at Cores ferry, then on toward Great
River, then on near Exlettingtown after halting sometime we
marched through Duplan County to Downing creek at the fair bluff
then march to Elizabeth town on Cape fair River - then back to
Smithfield in Johnson county where we first marched from
Serve three months - got discharged & went home, & in about twelve
months was drafted for another three months tour and march under
Capt. John Dent under Col. Neeham Bryan & marched across
the River below Darborough town & through Green County & on near
Edenton expecting to meet Beattick & Gory, and after staying there a
few weeks - marched up Roanoke River to Halifax town, an was
stationed there about two weeks then on through Nash County
was private of Gory, an into Wake County, served three months
and was discharged by Capt. Dent, the year not recollected - About
four or five Months after this I with a number of others was
called on by Col. John Smith of Johnson County to guard a parcel
British prisoners, about one hundred & thirty in number that was
sent to Smithfield to be guarded till they could be exchanged
I served as guard two months & was discharged - by order of
Col. Smith - he remembers being with Gen. Greens army in his
march toward Wilmington but did not remain long with Gen
Green, he also remembers of being murdered by Adjutant
Childers while with Gen Greens army, the year not recollected

Not long after I was discharged from guarding the British
prisoners now orders come for some eighteen months men
to be raised I for one turned out a volunteer and when
come to march I sent my brother in my place & he
~~was discharged~~ I was discharged.

I have no papers to prove what year but it was near the
end of the war as well as recollected. Neither have I any
papers nor do I know of any person now living by whom I
could prove my services.

I hereby relinquish every claim whatever to a pension or
annuity except ^{the present} and declare his name is not on the pension
role of the agency of any state

A. In Johnson County N Carolina May 25th 1750
- Q 2. Have you any record of your age if so where is it
A. Yes in a family bible kept by my father of his childrens ages
- Q 3. Where were you living when called into service and
where have you lived ever since the revolutionary war &
where do you now live
A. I lived in Johnson County N Carolina when called in to service
and continued to live there until the year 1793. I move to
Lancaster District South Carolina & near the N Carolina line
where I have lived ever since
- Q 4. How were you called into service were you drafted did you
volunteer or were you a substitute and if a substitute of whom
Ans. A Volunteer and drafted. I served two three months tours
a drafted soldier and two two months tours a volunteer and
sent my servant in the eighteen months tour
- Q 5. State the names of some of the regular officers who were with
the troops where you served. Such Continental & Militia regiments
as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service
Ans. Gen Green. Col Needham Bryan adjutant. Children. Capt
Henry French. Capt John Dent and Col Smith. these were
Militia officers & lived in Johnson County at that time. except Gen Green
and he was a continental
- Q 6. Did you ever receive a discharge from the service and if so by
whom was it given and what has become of it.

As I do not remember ever receiving a written discharge from
my officers, but mostly think I did so but what has become of it
I do ^{not know} at this time

At 7. State ^{name} of persons to whom you are known in your
present neighbourhood & who can testify to your character for
Veracity & their belief of your service as a soldier of the
revolution - Jesse Sewellen & Joshua Walters

County of Anson and State of N Carolina and is a Credable person
and that their statement is intitled to Credit

Also it appears to me that James Holliman the above named applic-
ant is so infirm that he could not with convenience attend a Court
of record and the reason that he applies in this way it is most
easy for him in his present situation and living near the State
line
